Europe's tourism sector is at the heart of European ecosystems and a major part of it is linked to oceans and seas.


Over half of the EU's tourist accommodation establishments are located in coastal and insular areas.

According to the figures of our Blue Economy report, coastal and maritime tourism is representing 45% of the GVA and 64% of the employment of the EU Blue economy.

However the tourism sector, along with the other sectors of the Blue Economy, is particularly exposed to the threats of climate change and biodiversity degradation



COVID impacts





The Commission has outlined possible scenarios for a transition pathway toward a more resilient, sustainable and innovative tourism ecosystem (February 2022).

In the context of greener tourism destination and services, there is need on strengthening the sustainable development of coastal and maritime tourism including cruise and yachting, for increasing coastal resilience, by investing in nature based solutions.

Member states and Regions could actively support sustainable mobility developments while destinations and Industry could actively collaborate with local administrations to diversify to find innovative business models for a more sustainable coastal, maritime and cruise tourism

This is another key asset that will help crossborder cooperation and deliver on the sustainable development of Blue Economy sectors.










